Our network brings together early childhood lecturers, from Initial Teacher Education (ITE) providers, committed to supporting Associate Teachers (AT's) in the Auckland region.

Our vision recognises

ITE programmes value the significant place of authentic partnership relationships within the shared responsibility for student success.

Within ITE the role of the Associate Teacher (AT) is essential to the design, delivery and assessment of Student Teachers (ST)

In the past Individual providers have an ad hoc approach to design and delivery of AT professional development. In 2008 we recognised an opportunity for greater collaboration to maximise the AT experience of PD.

In 2019 the Teaching Council set out new requirements for ITE with a greater focus on partnership.

As graduate capabilities are proven in real-world settings, it's crucial to build responsive and reciprocal partnerships between ITE and ECE practitioners.

History of the Associate Teacher Symposium

Beginning in 2008, a committee of passionate ITE lecturers recognised a demand for low priced professional learning and networking opportunities

Between 2008 and 2023 this committee have run 13 events across Tamaki Makaurau.

Our 2023 symposium is in November, hosted by the team at MIT

A time of reflection and evaluation (& covid)

We published an article in Early Education 2021: The Tāmaki Makaurau Associate Teacher Network A reflection on a decade+ of AT support

 The following slides present a summary of key findings from AT research

Key areas for ITE providers to consider

- A greater continuity across providers
- Clearer communication, fairness and transparency,
- Student Teacher to be well-prepared for the practicum,
- AT's expressed concerns about the workload required to mentor and assess ST,
- AT's find it most difficult when ST's are not meeting expectations or are challenging

Associate Teachers perspective

- Associate Teachers value the opportunity for ako-based relationships with ST, viewing professional experience as a mutual learning experience.
- Recognise the value of providing a learner-focused experience that allows ST to engage in reflection and critical thinking.
- That AT's wish to feel recognised and valued in the time that they bring to the role for some this would include a greater financial recognition.

Associate Teachers require Student Teachers to be able to:

- Engage with diverse philosophies and experience (recognising there is no one way to teach)
- Reflect on established practice and favour extending learning moments
- Demonstrate respect and responsibility through being conscientious about meeting their learning outcomes and written and practical form

The future of ITE partnerships

- There is some interest in online delivery of training, including webinars.
- There appears to be reduced interest for face-to-face delivery from providers.
- Share current research/readings/theories ideas, for their own learning
- Provide clearer and more transparent communication of expectations, as well as supports for ST's who are challenging/not succeeding.

Where to next for the AT symposium 2023?

 We are still committed to providing annual AT events in responsive ways. .

 We must recognise the impact of the global pandemic on workloads across the education sector.

 We will continue to develop genuine, responsive reciprocal relationships with AT's as key partners in ITE
